MUSIC NOTES:

Samuel Crossman (1624-1683), an English clergyman and hymn writer, authored the words of this morning's Hymn of the Day ("My Song Is Love Unknown" – *ELW* #343) in 1664. After he and some 2,000 other Puritan-leaning ministers were expelled from the Church of England, Crossman renounced his Puritan affiliations and was reinstated, receiving a post at Bristol in 1667. He became Dean of Bristol Cathedral in 1683, the year in which he later passed away. The tune paired with Crossman's text was composed by John Ireland (1879-1962) in 1918. An English composer, organist, and choirmaster, Ireland wrote his "Love Unknown" tune over lunch one day at the suggestion of fellow organist and composer Geoffrey Shaw.

The text of the Recessional Hymn ("There in God's Garden" – *ELW* #342) was originally written by a 17th-century Hungarian Reformed pastor for Good Friday. Erik Routley (1917-1982), an English Congregational minister, composer, and hymnologist who became Professor of Church Music at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ, prepared an English version of the original Hungarian text in 1974. K. Lee Scott (b. 1950), an internationally- known composer of sacred music, wrote the tune "Shades Mountain" for Routley's text in 1995. He named the tune after a mountain near his home in Birmingham, Alabama, that is part of the southern foothills of the Appalachian chain.
