A Note from the Vicar

Living and learning together as Lutherans requires us to occasionally remember what it is we are called to do as members of God's church within the global society. In its social statement, *Church in Society: A Lutheran Perspective*, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America believes,

As a reconciling and healing presence, this church is called to minister to human need with compassion and imagination. It strives to pioneer new ways of addressing emerging social problems and environmental degradation. This church has a responsibility to mediate conflict and to advocate just and peaceful resolutions to the world's divisions. It should support institutions and policies that serve the common good and work with and learn from others in caring for and changing global society.^A

We are called to minister to human need with compassion and imagination. The congregations at Brickerville United and Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran churches are full of compassion. This is evident in the generous giving of our time, our talents, and our treasures as we care for one another and the environment. However, I sometimes pause to consider how much imagination we are putting to use as we work in these ways. How are we striving to be pioneers in our response to emerging social and environmental concerns? Pioneers are people who develop and are the first to use or apply a new method, area of knowledge, or activity.^B

Pioneering through imagination requires us to take a step in faith, to explore and experiment with new ideas and methods. It requires us to evaluate what we know and have experienced for relevance, effectiveness, and efficiency. We look back as a source of inspiration as we imagine what lays ahead. God created all things. We cannot fully know what he has in store for us, but we must remain faithful to his call as he inspires our imaginations to become pioneers in care of all his creations. "By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible."^C

As the days of winter expire and we prepare to welcome spring, may each of us be renewed in our commitment to *minister to human need with compassion and imagination.*

As love and support are given you, you in turn must render love and support to Christ in his needy ones. You must feel with sorrow all the dishonors done to Christ in his holy Word, all the misery of Christendom, all the unjust suffering of the innocent, with which the world is everywhere filled to overflowing. You must fight, work, pray, and—if you cannot do more, have heartfelt sympathy.^D

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

As we begin our observance of Lent on Ash Wednesday (March 5th), Claudia Frances Hernaman's hymn, "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days," provides a perfect text for our private devotions during this 40-day season of fasting, penitence, and prayer. A paraphrase of her hymn appears on page 319 of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*. The original text (shown below) was first published in 1873 as part of a collection of hymns for children. By the mid-20th century, "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days" was a standard Lenten hymn in most hymnals throughout the United States. The words are based on the account of the temptation of Jesus found in three Gospels (Matthew 4:1-11, Mark 1:12-13, and Luke 4:1-13), and the classic themes of Lent are presented in the hymn's five stanzas: fasting and prayer (stanza 1); struggle with Satan and sin (stanza 2); dying to self, meditation on scripture (stanza 3); penitence (stanza 4); and looking toward the joy of Easter (stanza 5).

Born in Surrey, England in 1838, Hernaman was the daughter and wife of Church of England priests. While we know little about her life, she must have been well educated since she wrote hymns in English and also translated Latin and German texts. Once married, Hernaman found her calling in the religious education of children. She wrote children's Christmas carols, Sunday School hymns, a children's hymn book, and translations primarily intended for the young. Altogether, Hernaman wrote or translated about 150 hymns. She died in Brussels, Belgium in 1898.

*Lord, who throughout these forty days
For us didst fast and pray,
Teach us with thee to mourn our sins,
And close by thee to stay.*

*As thou with Satan didst contend,
And didst the vict'ry win,
O give us strength in thee to fight,
In thee to conquer sin.*

*As thou didst hunger bear and thirst,
So teach us, gracious Lord,
To die to self, and chiefly live
By thy most holy word.*

*And through these days of penitence,
And through thy Passiontide,
Yea, evermore, in life and death,
Jesus! with us abide.*

*Abide with us, that so, this life
Of suff'ring overpast,
An Easter of unending joy
We may attain at last!*

Reports:

Secretary: The December 9, 2025 Secretary's Report was distributed and discussed. Dave Carson made a motion to accept the Secretary's Report, Brad Clubb seconded the motion, the motion was accepted.

Treasurer: 1. The December 31, 2024 Treasurer's Report was distributed and discussed. Beth Smith reported that the 2024 Budget was met. Discussion took place regarding establishing a separate account for the interest on the interest on the Carpenter Fund. This money would be used for any need of the church at the Council's discretion. Jeanine Schreiber made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report subject to audit, Floss Morgan seconded the motion, the motion was accepted.

2. Offering envelopes: the "Building Fund" envelope will be changed to "Property Maintenance". We were able to order a lesser quantity of envelopes which should decrease the cost of the envelopes by 50%.

Vicar: The December 2024 Vicar's Report was distributed and discussed.

Memorial: no report

Property: the committee met in January with former committee chair Janet Craley briefing the committee on current projects and issues in the church building. Brenda Fetter will now be the contact person for any property issues. The Bradford pear trees have been trimmed; Joyce and Brad Burkholder have removed a broken safe from the building.

Service: next meeting 1/30/2025

Stewardship: no report

Mutual Ministry: the Mutual Ministry will be used for Jerusalem staff except the Vicar, as the Vicar is supported by the Shared Ministry Committee. Vicar Philip encouraged the Committee to meet with the staff several times per year.

Shared Ministry: A joint photo directory is being planned so that the members of JELC and BULC can better recognize each other. Universal Church Directories has been chosen to compile this directory with no cost to the congregations. Photo sessions will be completed this spring. Each member will receive a free directory and a 8x10 photo; each session will last 45 min- one hour.

Old Business:

1. Communication and information: the members of the congregation are asked to notify the Council President JD Wissler or Vicar Philip of anything that should be addressed by Council no later than one week prior to the Council meeting, which is the third Monday of each month. Any issue requiring a Council vote should also be brought to JD Wissler or Vicar Philip one week prior to the Council meeting. Council packets will be ready for Council members one week prior to Council meetings

2. Committees:

- a. The Council has recommended the following members for the Audit Committee: Jeff Schreiber, Jean Slaymaker and Brenda Fetter. Each member serves a three year term with one member being replaced each year. Dave Carson made a motion to accept Jeff Schreiber, Jean Slaymaker and Brenda Fetter to the Audit Committee, Brad Clubb seconded the motion, the motion was accepted.
- b. A Nominating Committee for 2025 will need to be selected and voted on at the Annual Meeting on February 16, 2025. The following members are willing to serve: Rene Amey, Mike Fetter, and Jean Slaymaker. A vote will take place on February 16, 2025.

3. Constitution/Bylaws: Synod returned our draft with recommended edits that were required to meet the ELCA standards. Vicar Philip made the required edits and will resubmit to Synod with additional changes to the required number of Council members and a change to the quorum requirement for congregational meetings. Once the Constitution is approved, the next step is for each Committee to write Bylaws to govern each respective Committee. Currently, the only Committees that have Bylaws are the Audit and Nominating committees.

New Business:

1. Jeanine Schreiber suggested that we assist the victim of the fire at Earl Lane which is in the trailer park across from the church. Jill Clubb will reach out to the Warwick HUB to see if we can assist through their program.

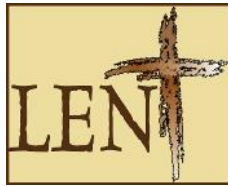
